They may suffer isolation, stigma and poverty and there is evidence to suggest that they are three times more likely than their peers to become offenders. We help to build their selfesteem and confidence to equip them to make the right choices in later life...

How Barnardo's helped us

My name is Leon and I live with my Mam, Da, my brother Kevin and my little brother George. We don't have a lot and we manage most of the time but it's difficult now me Da's in prison.

When we visit Da we always tell him we miss him loads and we ask him how long he will be gone for. I worry about the times I have been nasty to him and I need him to know that I didn't mean it and that I love him in my heart and I'm heartbroken he's gone.

Because Da's in prison I feel gutted and sickful. Sometimes I need to talk



to him and I don't know what to do when I can't. I can't talk to my friends because they might laugh at me and spread rumours.

Going away with Barnardo's was excellent. The best thing was making new friends and having someone to talk to. Kevin's favourite thing was the food! All my new friends cheered when I climbed the crag which felt really great and I am looking forward to seeing them again when we meet for activities.

We will both remember this weekend for a very long time.

Delivering Services for the most vulnerable children


This year you've supported us to transform the lives of more than 200,000 children, young people and families.

We ran over 100 new services for children, bringing the total number of services we run in the UK to more than 900.

We have been widely recognised for our work with children; 87 per cent of external inspections (that provide a rating) have rated our services 'good' or above, compared with 74 per cent in 2011-12.

Some of our new services include:

- Sussex B-Safe to work directly with young people to reduce their vulnerability to child sexual exploitation
- Dundee Early Intervention Team, which aims to improve the lives of children and families, addressing problems before they get any worse and preventing the need for greater interventions
- B@1 to help young people in Newport, Wales, tackle issues related to their drug or alcohol misuse
- The Hub in Guernsey to provide expert advice to teenagers who are having problems at home or school.

Peter, Suzanne, Erin, Jude and Rory's story

'When you start a family, you have this image; this is what I'm going to be like as a daddy, this is what we're going to be like as a family and we'll do this and we'll do that.

When two of your children have autism, you just have to take that, crumple it into a ball and throw it away. That's no longer what exists, it's just a dream.

Jude was diagnosed with autism when he was four. You couldn't involve him in playing with anything, he was on his own agenda. He had no sense of danger, he tried to climb out of his bedroom window. He couldn't cope with days out, he would go into complete meltdown, kicking, crying, terrified.

'We are happier than we've been in a long, long time.'

> Rory, who's two, has a very different type of autism. He has no speech, he's clumsy. Erin has a double curvature in her spine so she's been in serial plaster casts.

It was very hard to have three young children with complex needs, it's been an emotional rollercoaster. I stopped work to look after them. But the support from Barnardo's has helped us come out the other side.

Carol from the Parent and Infant Project came over every week to work with Jude. If he was into animals, she brought little animal puppets to help his communication.

I've bonded with Rory much more at Barnardo's Parent and Infant Group. He loves it, you can tell as soon as he gets in the car park, he knows where he's going. He's met other children there and likes the toys and singing.

Barnardo's gave us a lot of encouragement. It was them saying "this is normal, that's the way it goes, keep at it". So I kept taking Rory to the local baby gym and finally he could walk on the beams. We know we've got struggles ahead but now we've got the tools to get through a lot of it. The five of us are more content and happy than we've been in a long, long time.'

Early family intervention improves parenting skills, children's learning and reduces the need for

Fighting for the most vulnerable Barnardo's Annual Review 2013

Campaigning for change



With your help, we achieved five changes to government policy for the benefit of vulnerable children, young people and families.

Our ongoing Cut them free campaign to protect children from sexual exploitation continued to gain support. With your help, we influenced the first police and crime commissioner elections in November, petitioning candidates to pledge their support to tackling child sexual exploitation (CSE) in their area. In total, 1,702 people wrote to their local police and crime commissioner candidate, leading to 91 candidates pledging their support.

In September the Scottish Parliament's Petitions Committee, after considering our CSE petition signed by 3,000 people across Scotland, agreed to carry out an inquiry into CSE in Scotland. The inquiry will lead to concerted action to tackle the problem.

Our report Developing pathways into children and family services for mothers involved in the criminal justice system encouraged professionals in the criminal justice system and children's services to work together, to benefit children affected by parental imprisonment.



January's *Paying to work* report highlighted that the Government's introduction of universal credit could increase child poverty because of high childcare costs faced by families.

The Government's pupil premium funding – introduced to improve the education outcomes of the UK's poorest children – was examined in our *Mind the gap* report. We found that the funding missed out three and four-year-olds and recommended how this could be rectified to help close the attainment gap between poor children and their better-off classmates.







Our Remember they are children petition fought to get our legal system to treat young victims of sexual exploitation as children. In total 30,160 people pledged their support – three times more than our original target. Our petition gave momentum to the need to change how vulnerable victims and witnesses are treated in court.

A brave young lady

Tayyibah's story – helping young carers

T've been caring for my mum three years now, since I was 10. It's just the two of us. I didn't tell no one about it until school found out because I was missing days.

Mum's got prolapsed discs in her back and can't walk much. Before Barnardo's helped us out, I had to take all the clothes to the launderette. To do the shopping, I had to walk a mile to Asda, get money out with mum's bank card, and carry the bags home.

I used to get into trouble because I didn't do my homework but I couldn't actually find the time to do it. One night when Mum overdosed on her medication I had to call the ambulance and wait with her in A&E. Next day, the teacher shouted at me for being late.

The first thing Barnardo's did was get us carers. That definitely took the pressure off me.

Kelly at Barnardo's, she's always been there for me. Like I told her we didn't have a washing machine and now we've got one through a Barnardo's grant. She's like a magical fairy godmother because if you've got a problem you can just tell her and it's solved. She takes me to all the time-out sessions too.

We had a lot of problems with our house as well. Our back door used to have a big gap at the bottom and rats made it worse nibbling through it, which brought a really bad draught in winter. We were freezing – even the shampoo bottles used to freeze. We were living like that for ages. The landlord only fixed things after Kelly got on his case.

Since Barnardo's got involved it's made a massive difference in my life. Before there was a black hole and I was being sucked into it. Now I can actually see myself going to college, getting my A-levels.'

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Our finances are in a strong position to help more children

Our income was £258.1 million in 2012-13 (compared to £245.2 million in 2011-12). By managing our expenditure carefully and through the success of our fundraising and stores, we generated a surplus of £6.2 million, which will help us grow our work to transform the lives of the most vulnerable children.



Highlights of 2012-13

- Our supporters, fundraising staff and volunteers worked incredibly hard to raise £32.7 million net income to help vulnerable children.
- Retail and Trading raised £10.9 million for our services. Our partnership with Argos generated 71,251 bags of toys for our stores, equating to £712,500 towards our work.
- We secured a number of contracts to run services, including supporting troubled families to improve children's school attendance and reduce antisocial behaviour.

Steph's story - giving care leavers a home

'I went into foster care when I was three because my real parents were taking drugs and couldn't look after me and my brother. We got separated and went to different places.

I was lucky; I lived with my foster family for 14 years. You've got people who are in and out of different children's homes, like my brother was. I sometimes felt different to everybody else though, an outcast.

'Now I'm living in a Barnardo's flat - I'm proud of my home.'

> When I was 17, I left care as I was having problems with my foster parents. I was drinking, feeling like I never got to do what I wanted.

different places where I could live. I chose Barnardo's 16+ shared flat. When I first moved in I was sleeping all day and going out drinking at night.

But then Barnardo's started to support me, trying to get me into education. They encouraged me to start a college course in events management.

They gave me a lot of emotional help. I would knock and say "have you got five minutes?" and five minutes would turn into hours. Talking always makes me feel better, especially when you're talking to someone who will always have advice for you.

Now I'm living on my own in one of Barnardo's satellite flats. It's been good making this house into a home. I'm very proud of it. I clean it all the time, I deal with my bills, I look after myself.

For now, I'm really enjoying life. I'm at college, I have my own place - I feel like I'm moving forward.

Without Barnardo's I wouldn't be in college now; I'd be lying in my bed every day and going back to drinking and being useless.

I think services like this are very important to young people leaving care because the staff listen to you and respect you.'

Our staff and volunteers

In 2012-13, our 8,000 staff devoted themselves to helping vulnerable children. Fifteen thousand people chose to volunteer with us and give something back to their local communities.

Highlights of 2012-13:

- Our staff and volunteers won a number of awards. Louise Wardale of our Keeping the Family in Mind service in Liverpool won the Health and Wellbeing Campaigner award at the Mersey Care NHS Trust annual Positive Achievement Awards. Louise was nominated for tirelessly championing the rights and needs of young carers.
- Barnardo's student fundraisers from the University of Central Lancashire won the prestigious UK Event award for best student event for the third year running. The winning event, Urban, included beatbox artists, breakdancers, hip-hop artists, a graffiti artist and a display of free running, and contributed to the £13,000 the group have raised so far for us.
- We were awarded the Investing in Volunteers Award in Wales. To achieve this UK quality standard for recruiting volunteers, we were assessed against a range of best practice standards.



We were proud that a number of our staff and volunteers were nominated as Olympic torchbearers during the Olympic Torch relays in 2012. Our volunteers Jamie Meyrick (Liverpool Allerton store); David Backhouse (Indigo service for young carers); Neil Adams (St Ives store); and Gill George (Haverford West Fundraising Group) were specially handpicked to participate. Three of our staff carried the Olympic Torch: Stephen Bellis, Leaving Care Personal Adviser; Brian Baines, Project Worker at Hartlepool Services; and Mike Dobson, Advocate at Wetherby Youth Offending Institute, were all nominated.

■ Barnardo's Helper Groups (BHG) and professional fundraising groups raised more than £360,000 by holding raffles, fundraising lunches, bake sales and auctions, including Diamond Jubilee fundraising events.



Skilling up

Sophie's story – helping young people not in education, employment or training (NEET)



'I grew up in Ely in Cardiff. It's a rough place, there's always something happening.

I didn't enjoy school one bit, mainly because I was badly bullied. In Year 11 I just gave up. I couldn't wait to leave.

I was feeling really unhappy because I couldn't get a job. All I wanted was to go out to work and be earning, not sitting at home doing nothing all day, being bored and down.

The first thing Barnardo's did was get me on their placement scheme with KFC. I stayed the full month and gained skills greeting customers. It gave me the boost I needed.

I found Barnardo's very different. Being positive and believing in me really helped. Training providers, they just try to get you out in a placement, but with Barnardo's they support you, they guide you and funding-wise as well, it's continuously there. Like, helping me to pay for my bus fares to get to KFC.

Bryn, my Project Worker, has helped me overcome a lot. He's been there when I'm going through a bad patch, when my confidence is going down. He's always there to give you that boost, you know, "we believe in you and we know you can do it".

Bryn put me forward for my current six month paid placement with Scottish and Southern Electric (SSE). Now I'm in an administrator role, mainly office duties, working on a computer. I'm learning new skills every day.

I take two buses to work and it takes 90 minutes each way but I don't mind. This placement means such a lot to me. I screamed when I got my first pay cheque! If Barnardo's hadn't been there, I would 100 per cent be stuck on the dole right now.

Now when I see those bullies from school, I think to myself they're stuck at home doing nothing and I'm out working.'
